

Sessions

Friday

Dr Bradley Merrick: Meeting the needs of our young rockers head on! Contemporary Music, Technology and the Emerging needs of the 21st Century Musician. As music education becomes more diverse (technology, formal and informal learning) and the art of teaching shifts towards facilitation and constructing knowledge and understanding, we need to consider the key factors that are influencing our students in the 21st Century. This presentation will draw on research completed into young rock and pop musicians, emerging approaches to using new technologies and successful components of the best classroom practice. Combined with a range of classroom examples you will be challenged to think about our musicians of the future and what we need to do in order to connect successfully with them.

Heidi King: Redefining the learning walk: An innovative approach to reflective practice for the conductor-music educator. An adapted Participatory Learning Walk (PLW) model has the potential to generate powerful teacher reflection, inform educational practice and in turn enhance student learning. An adapted PLW model (ongoing, structured classroom visits by senior staff members and other colleagues) can facilitate reflective practice and improve student learning in ensemble music education.

Georgina Harvey: The learning behaviours of middle primary students in a collaborative music task. Many previous studies have identified the potential of music education to benefit social skill development, but have only placed little emphasis on student perceptions of music learning. This study aimed to fill this gap in the literature through data collected from 12 student participants. The data revealed that participants enjoyed the task because of its collaborative and musical nature and displayed a majority of positive collaborative behaviours throughout the task.

Kim Waldock: SSO Education Program: More fool-proof music lessons for Primary teachers. Looking for some new inspiring music lessons to use in your classroom? Come to this workshop for primary music teachers (regardless of musical knowledge) which is packed full of singing, playing, composing, moving and listening activities that are linked to key competences and learning outcomes as outlined in the National Curriculum on the Arts. Supported by comprehensive digital resources, the workshops will be about ways for learning music by doing music.

Dr Bradley Merrick+ Turbulence+ Small Town City: *Open Rock Band Session*. In these sessions, Brad will work with composition components and also offer advice on developing performance structure and musicality through effective rehearsal skills and refinement.

Brett Budgeon: *Cross-Genre Singing.* See firsthand strategies to engage young performers with a diverse range of musical experiences. Brett will work with and talk to two young performers who are entering year 12 this year and their journey towards tertiary music study. Brett will reveal the long term planning from primary school to year 12 to achieve a suitable skills set to successfully achieve entry into a range of higher education settings.

Dr Dave Carter: Basic microphone technique for secondary ensembles and rock bands. In this session Dave will be covering how to set up and record electric bass and guitar amplifiers, acoustic guitars and drum kits. Dave will also look at basic stereo recording set ups for recording ensembles and acoustic groups. Finally Dave will be demonstrating how to record these using computer software such as Protools, and he will explore some of the different microphone types best suited to these types of recordings

Kim Waldock: SSO Education Program: Composition workshop Learning from Brett Dean. In this 2-hour workshop we will track the use of dissonance and part writing from the thirteen hundreds to the present day and then look at how Australian composer Brett Dean has emerged from this tradition. Focusing on Mozart's Dissonance Quartet, The Great Fugue by Beethoven, Weill's Threepenny Opera Overture and Dean's clarinet concerto Ariel's Music and new trumpet concerto Dramatis Personæ. Supported by comprehensive resources that provide practical activities and strategies for implementation in the classroom. The workshop is aimed at high school music teachers and supports the SSO's National Sinfonietta Composition project for high school aged composers.

Stephen King: Redefining the conductor as Conductor-Music Educator. This study examined the lived experience of the researcher as a conductor, a teacher, a learner and a musician, interrogating my work as a conductor-music educator. It explored the dual perspective of a conductor and a music educator primarily involved with teaching music through a large instrumental ensemble, a context in which these two roles are inextricably inter-linked.

Cynthia Howard: Engaging primary students through an instrumental music program. Cynthia uses an easy marimba piece that is highly engaging and encompasses a number of instruments all in a 10 week unit. Children experience high energy music, learn to play various instruments, guitar, ukulele, drums, djembes, marimbas and keyboards where improvisation and compositional techniques can all be introduced. This is a fun and exciting unit for all involved.

Dr Bradley Merrick: Belief, Grit and Determination - Preparation for Success! The importance of motivation and purposeful feedback for the young musician. In a world where students are continually assessed (and marks often get in the way of learning), this session will unpack the importance of developing the belief of your students, in all areas of their music making, whether composition, performance or aural development. In light of recent literature and emerging research, this session will draw upon existing models of performance practice, motivation theory and related approaches to student evaluation and self-assessment. The value of setting meaningful goals, completing purposeful practice combined with self-reflection will be discussed in light of classroom programmes and linked to emerging use of digital tools for immediate feedback. The importance of developing the complete musician (socially, emotionally and physically) will underpin the presentation, as you take away new ideas and approaches to the development of musical 'understanding' in your own classroom.

Brett Budgeon: Contemporary Vocal Resources. Brett will introduce and demonstrate the latest software for vocal development built and designed by the fraternity of voice teachers working in the USA. He will highlight the benefits of this software to enhance and engage young performers/voices. He will talk about the potential and application into the school learning environment. The software is used and endorsed by the biggest names in contemporary music industry, these endorsements serve as a catalyst for inspiration and vocal development.

Dr Dave Carter: *DIY audio for the primary classroom and others.* How to record your students on a budget using your available computer and basic software.

Dr Bradley Merrick	Keynote Presenter Brad Merrick is currently Director of Research in Learning at Barker College in Sydney where he is also a member of the Music Department directing the Concert and Stage Bands. His current role involves the development and implementation of large research projects across the whole school. Brad is a classroom music specialist who focuses on the development of curriculum and technology, while also being strongly involved in the development of performance ensembles. Brad has published several textbooks for secondary music and has been strongly involved with the exploration of new approaches to teaching and learning in music education. He has presented at national and international conferences, symposia and forums, with his specialist areas including music technology, motivation and classroom practice Brad plays guitar, bass and trumpet, having spent many years performing and touring as professional guitarist around Australia and New Zealand.
